The homicide law is a highly fragmented inscription but states that it is up to the victim's relatives to prosecute a killer. According to the preserved part of the inscription, unintentional homicides received a sentence of exile. It is not clear whether Draco's law specified the punishment for intentional homicide.

Solon, an Athenian statesman, and lawmaker refined Draco's laws and is credited with "democratizing" justice by making the courts more accessible to citizens. Solon revised every statute except that on homicide and made Athenian law altogether more humane. The Areiopagos is reputed to be the most ancient homicide court in Greece.

One of the most famous law givers in Athens was Draco. His homicide law is the first known written law of Ancient Greece. He was appointed law giver in Athens after a failed Cylon attempt to overthrow the government.

Ancient Greek Laws. Most of Draco's punishments were ruthless. As a result, his laws were refined by another Athenian statesman and lawmaker, Solon. Solon was appointed the lawmaker in 594 BC. He completely changed the laws as set by Draco except for the punishment of exile for the crime of homicide.

Draco's law code was later regarded as intolerably harsh, especially in regards to punishing trivial crimes with death; it was probably unsatisfactory to contemporary rulers too, since Solon, who was the archon in 594 BCE, later repealed Draco's code and published new laws, retaining only Draco's homicide statutes. The cruelty behind the laws may have been the only a way to sustain power within the aristocratic party as well as preventing blood feuds that could last for generations.

Draconian laws. Aristotle, the chief source for knowledge of Draco, claims that his were the first written Athenian laws and that Draco established a constitution enfranchising hoplites, the lower class soldiers. The Draconian laws were most noteworthy for their harshness; they were said to be written in blood, rather than ink.

A late lexicographer, as explained by MacDowell in his Athenian Homicide Law (pp. 111 – 12), explained that the tympanon was shaped like a club, and that it was later replaced by a sword, suggesting that criminals were beaten to death. MacDowell and other writers, including Todd, suggest that it was a board stuck into the ground to which the victim was fastened and left to die of exposure and thirst, in a manner roughly similar to crucifixion.
